









Most Asian American registered voters are unaffiliated when it comes to political parties. Among NHPI registered voters, 44% identify as Democrat and 18% as Republican.





ETHNIC BREAKDOWN OF TURNOUT AND PRESIDENTIAL VOTE NATIONALLY




VOTER TURNOUT BY ETHNICITY (AMONG REGISTERED VOTERS)
